Chenies Parish Council

Suggested additions to the list of buildings
of special architectural or historic interest.

1. The Roman Villa at Latimer Park Farm.
- 12/1. St. Michael's ~~Church~~ Church is presently listed -
if this does not include the Bedford Chapel then :-
- ~~12/2.~~ The Bedford Memorial Chapel.
- 12/2. The owner of the Manor House is wrongly described
on the present list and should read A.F.M. Matthews.
- 12/7. No. 50 Chenies is already listed - it is considered
that the other half of this block (of similar date
and style) No.52 should also be listed.
3. Dodds Mill. There has been a mill on this sight
since the early 13th century. Some of the mill
buildings were renewed about 1811 but the Mill House
is thought to be substantially the corn mill shown
on the estate map of 1735/36.
4. The Lodge (42) Chenies. Standing on the sight of the
Goat Inn. An Inn stood on this sight before 1613
and was largely rebuilt in 1688. The present house
was built on the old foundations in 1857 as two
cottages, being the Lodge to Chenies House and
occupied by the coachman and head gardener. Considered
a good example of Victorian estate housing in the
'olde English' style.
5. The Conduit(or village pump). A pleasant example
of a village pump date uncertain (circa 1830).
- 12/8. The Red Lion public house is already listed but
Banner Rest (the cottage adjoining the Red Lion
to the north) is believed to have been part of the
original Red Lion and dates prior to 1735.

6. The Baptist Chapel circa 1778 together with ~~the~~ the Manse and Kingscote both of which are thought to predate the Chapel itself.
7. The Old Rectory. This house circa 1700 has been partially rebuilt but part of the old house remains.
8. Shepwhites. Built approximately 1858 and of similar appearance to item 4.
9. Lodge Farm. Believed to be a former hunting lodge and part Tudor.
10. Great Green Street Farm. The Barn attached to this property is believed to be of some antiquity although somewhat altered in recent years.
11. The turnpike milestone. Standing to the south of the A.404 about 200 yards west of the village.
