

The 1999 Annual General Meeting of the Chenies Village Society will be held on Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> April 1999 at 8.00pm in The Long Room, Chenies Manor, by the kind permission of Lt. Colonel and Mrs. Macleod Matthews.

All residents of Chenies Village are invited to attend and will be very welcome. This is an opportunity to catch up on Village News and Events over the past twelve months and find out about forthcoming plans. It is also an opportunity to put questions to the members of the Parish Council who are present and for an exchange of views about, and ideas for, future village events – including celebrating the millennium.

This will be followed by the election of Officers and Committee Members for the coming year.

During the 1998/1999 term, and pending the AGM in April, the officers and members of the committee were pleased to appoint Nigel Ince as Acting Vice Chairman and two newcomers to Chenies onto the Committee: Chris Cartmell as a full member and Nick Morrison as a co-opted member.

In respect of the coming year, 1999/2000, two officers are standing down; Melanie Lilley as Chairman and Nigel Ince as Acting Vice Chairman. After many years as a stalwart of the Committee, Nigel Ince has decided not to stand for membership of the committee for the coming year.

Viv Bernard has also decided not to stand for re-election due to other commitments and plans.

The Rules of the Chenies Village Society make provision for a Committee of four officers: Chairman, Vice Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary plus eight other members. The Committee also has the power to co-opt up to two further members at any one time.

There are therefore opportunities for other residents to play a more active part in Village Affairs. Some of you may not be aware that Mr. Reeves, Head Teacher of Chenies County Combined School or 'The Village School' will be retiring at the end of the summer term. We will all be very sorry to see him leave us. Since his appointment as head Teacher of the school in June 1982, he has been dedicated to the school and the children who attend it and has achieved a great deal. He was instrumental helping us all celebrate the school's 150th anniversary in 1996, (you may recall seeing a copy of the commemorative photograph in the newsletter of the time) and last year the school was recognised for the high level of achievement of its pupils when the results of SATS tests placed them No. 2 in Buckinghamshire. I am sure that Mr Reeves, and all the children who have been lucky enough to attend the school, have many more stories and achievements to tell and remember.

In addition, Mr. Reeves has been very supportive of Village Society Events and has generously extended the use of the school for many Village events including the Christmas Parties, The Produce Show and The Parish Council, for which we are very grateful. The Village and his pupils will miss him – but it's not goodbye just yet.

In a recent letter to the Village Society Mr. Reeves wrote; 'in June 1982 I was appointed Headteacher of this school, and the last sixteen and a half years have been for me the most enjoyable and worthwhile part of my teaching career.....

I am sure that there will be an opportunity before I leave for me to express my thanks for all the magnificent support I have received during my time at the school. I would like to say at this stage how much I have appreciated all the encouragement from governors, staff, parents, children and the village community, and my thanks are due to each and every one of you for all the help and understanding I have received....'

### Buckinghamshire Best Kept Village Competition – May/June 1999

Chenies has again been entered for this competition, except this year there is a slight difference. In addition to the Best Kept Village Competition, this year a selected winner will also be entered for the "Village of the Year Award" co-sponsored by Calor Gas & The Daily Telegraph. It is proposed to enter the village which scores the highest overall mark, namely the winner of the "Sword of

Preliminary judging for the Buckinghamshire Best Kept Village competition will take place from 28<sup>th</sup> May – 16<sup>th</sup> June. This will be followed by a final inspection during early July with Winners being announced on 9<sup>th</sup> July.

Last year we won the Leofwine Shield for achieving the highest number of points in the competition – it would be great to win the cup this year.

In preparation for the Competition a Litter Blitz day, followed by a major spruce and clean up will be held shortly. Dates of these will be given out at the AGM on 15<sup>th</sup> April. However, we don't have for an organised litter blitz to look after our village, so please if you spot some rubbish, pick it up or if it is too big to manhandle or dispose of contact The Clerk of The Parish Council, Barbara Ruston who will alert the services.

### **Village Outing to Waddesdon Manor – Proposed date: 4th September 1999**

This year's annual village outing will be to Waddesdon Manor on Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> September. The manor was built at the end of the last century by Baron Ferdinand de Rothschild, to display his vast collection of 18<sup>th</sup> century art treasures. For those of you who have not been, it is a stunning French renaissance style chateau with a formal garden, parkland, a fabulous aviary and apparently wine cellars with over 15,000 bottles of Rothschild wines! (Unfortunately wine tasting may not be included in the visit).

The house was significantly refurbished quite recently. Tea is available if you wish and The Waddesdon Shop is apparently recognised as one of the best of its kind with many products being inspired by the Collection. – Apparently there is an adjacent Wine Shop which 'boasts the finest collection of wines from Rothschild family vineyards' - so for those of us attracted by the cellar but thwarted in the wine tasting all may not be lost!

Further information about this visit will be circulated nearer the time. As Waddesdon is a National Trust property admission charges will be waived for all who have National Trust membership.

## **PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**

### **Annual Parish Meeting**

The next meeting will be held on Monday 10<sup>th</sup> May 1999 at 8.00pm in the School Hall and is The Annual Parish Meeting. All residents in Chenies are welcome to attend the democratic quarter of an hour at the start of this meeting to ask questions of and share your views with members of the council.

### **Chenies Selected for Pilot Speed Limit Scheme**

After more years fighting our corner on the topic of traffic calming and speed limits than the members probably care to remember, The Parish Council were informed at Christmas that the County Council had adopted a new speed limit policy and that Chenies had been identified as a pilot site to trial this new policy! Subsequently the full Parish Council has met with the Senior Technician of Traffic management Projects within the Environmental Services Division of the County Council and confirmed Chenies enthusiasm, in principle, for taking part. The conditional "in principle" is because the scheme will need to be financed by the Parish Council, and funds are of course quite limited. However, were we to win the National "Village of the Year Award", the £3,000 prize money would go a long way to funding the project!

If you want to learn more about this trial come to the AGM on 15<sup>th</sup> April.

## Millennium Projects

This subject will also come up for discussion at the AGM. We are looking for views as to how residents of the Village would like to celebrate the millennium as a community.

However, members of the Council are currently exploring a variety of options, which the Parish Council may undertake to mark the arrival of the year 2,000. These include:

- A Millennium medallion to be presented to all children at the School and/or residents in Chenies. The medallions will also be available for purchase by other residents
- A flagpole for the School has already been offered and accepted
- An ornate Chenies sign on the Green, subject to Millennium Grant financing
- Chenies Village signs on the 'gateways' where the speed limit will commence, this being part of the Pilot Speed Limit Scheme


## OTHER NOTICES
